About the Artist

Born in Nigeria, Inua Ellams is a poet, playwright & performer, graphic artist & designer and founder of The Midnight Run (an arts-filled, night-time, urban walking experience), The Rhythm and Poetry Party (The R.A.P Party), which celebrates poetry & hip-hop, and Poetry + Film / Hack (P+F/H), which celebrates poetry and film. Identity, displacement & destiny are recurring themes in his work, where he tries to mix the old with the new: traditional African oral storytelling with contemporary poetics, paint with pixel, texture with vector. His books are published by Flipped Eye, Akashic, Nine Arches, Penned In The Margins and Oberon & Methuen.
