About the Artists

Mac Waters (they/he) is a dynamic multimedia composer and improviser working and performing across a spectrum of interdisciplinary contexts. His diverse creative practice spans composing chamber music for leading contemporary ensembles, composing electroacoustic music for film and dance, performing as a vocalist and violist in interdisciplinary and multimedia performances, designing interactive Virtual and Extended Reality experiences, and recording and producing original songs. Their works have been performed by Fonema Consort (Chicago), Wet Ink (New York City), Conrad Tao (New York City), Mivos Quartet (New York City), Ostravska Banda (Ostrava, Czech Republic), and Ars Futura (Cleveland). Mac's extensive capacity as a violist-improviser has been featured internationally in ensembles such as the Cherry-Ah-Cole Ensemble (Hanover, Hanover), the Venice Exploratory Ensemble (Venice, Italy), the International Contemporary Ensemble's Ensemble Evolution (New York City) and Anthony Braxton's Creative Orchestra (Darmstadt, Germany). As an XR for the Humanities Fellow with the Dartmouth College Data Experiences Visualization (DEV) Studio, he is developing a 3D-audio studio for interdisciplinary research and performance. They hold a BA in Music from Columbia University with a special concentration in Medieval & Renaissance Studies and are currently in pursuit of a MFA in Sonic Practice studying with Ash Fure, César Alvarez and Taylor Ho Bynum.

Charles Peoples III is a sonic changemaker. Their work encompasses performance art, music composition, poetry and choreography. With a focus on the convergence of sound, technology and spirituality, they create experiences that traverse realms of mysticism, queerness and transformation. Charles has performed his music at multiple conferences, workshops and theaters; significant mentions include the 9th International Sound Healing Conference, the New Living Expo, Oakland Pride Festival, San Jose Pride Festival and the Lesher Center for the Arts. Currently a grad student at

Dartmouth College, Charles is researching societal/individual misremembering and the therapeutic value of performance. He is now merging his interests in ancient ritual, storytelling, and shamanism with technology to create transformative, mystical, and immersive performances.

Eli Berman (she/they) is a vocalist, composerproducer and new instrument builder from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. She creates original music with electronics and extended vocal techniques, weaving together Ashkenazi Jewish cantorial singing, Yiddish and Appalachian folk song and western classical repertoire for countertenor, baritone and choir. For the past four years, Eli has developed noise instruments that extend the human voice through amplified PVC pipes, metals and percussion objects modulated by delay pedals and acoustic feedback. In the past two years she has begun to create house and techno beats from digital samples of her voice, contributing to the burgeoning U.S. Jewish rave scene called Kleztronica. Eli has premiered her music at National Sawdust, the Watermill Center, Banff Centre, New Music On the Point, Yiddish Summer Weimar, New Explorative Oratorio Voice Festival, Atlantic Music Festival, Gender Unbound, Princeton University, Dartmouth College and the New School. Eli recently opened the 2023 Snug Harbor Dance Festival (Staten Island, New York) with the premiere of Bonita Oliver's Trans Water Stories, for which Eli built an original vocal noise instrument. Eli contributed to and performed in Anna Lublina's 2023 show Undying in Yidderland: Jargon Rituals at Künstler*innenhaus Mousonturm (Frankfurt, Germany), and Eli performed her original track for the live premiere of Sanni Est's critically-acclaimed album PHOTOPHOBIA, which closed the 2022 Pop-Kultur Festival at Kulturbrauerei (Berlin, Germany). In addition to her experience as a countertenor and baritone in vocal ensembles such as C4: The Choral Composer/Conductor Collective (New York, New York), Eli has sung as a soloist in the 2018 US premiere of John Tavener's Total Eclipse at and a 2018

New York Times critically-acclaimed concert of works by Eve Beglarian at the Morgan Library and Museum. She has presented her music and creative research at the 2021 International Conference on New Interfaces for Musical Expression, 2020 Pan-American Vocology Association Symposium, and 2019 Transgender Singing Voice Conference. Sage Palmedo is a vocalist, music producer and energy healer with a mission of understanding and healing the collective body that is our Earth. Drawing from her background in sensory ecology and evolutionary neuroscience, she produces soundscapes that nourish the nervous system toward evolution and balance.

Hansini Bhasker (she/her) is a multi-genre vocalist, performer-composer, improviser and scholar, who deploys embodied music-making and movement for socio-ecological healing and change. She graduated Summa Cum Laude with a BA in Music from Princeton University with certificates in Vocal Performance, Cognitive Science, Entrepreneurship and Finance, and is currently pursuing a Music MA at Wesleyan University in Performance. She is a YoungArts winner in Voice whose musical practice bridges across Western classical opera, jazz, Karnatak, R&B, Kazakh saryarga, French chanson and experimental soundscape techniques. Her latest research explores cultural contrasts, evolutions and interactions in the use and control of vibration, pitch variation and oscillation in vocalization.

Meet **Sonicc Blush**. Born and bred amidst the glow of Columbus nightlife, her love affair with music blossomed beneath its celestial canopy. With her magnetic presence and electrifying energy, Sonicc Blush commands the decks with finesse, captivating crowds with her seamless transitions and infectious grooves. Whether it's the pulsating thump of house, the soulful melodies of R&B, or the bass-heavy rhythms of hip-hop, SB's palette knows no bounds.

The Washington DC-based Peace & Body Roll Duo **BOOMscat** will take you on an emotional, meditative journey through life, love and relationships. Multiinstrumentalist/producer, Asha "BOOM" Santee, and vocalist/songwriter Patience Sings create a sound that ignites vulnerability, elevation and selfreflection. Since their conception in the fall of 2012, BOOMscat has released five projects including No Life Jacket EP which reached #18 on the iTunes Top R&B Albums. BOOMscat has performed at several prestigious venues and institutions across the country, including The Kennedy Center, the National Museum of African American History and Culture and National Museum of Women in the Arts. Fresh off the high of their second time selling out back-to-back performances at DC's Legendary Blues Alley Jazz Supper Club, BOOMscat is currently working on their sixth recorded project and second studio album.

Kokayi is a preeminent improvisational vocalist, author, producer, Grammy-nominated musician and multi-disciplinary fine artist. He is a 2023 Guggenheim Fellow for Music Composition (the first emcee to be granted a Guggenheim for music composition), Halcyon Arts Fellow and Nicholson Arts Fellow. He has been a TEDxWDC presenter, speaking on "collaboration and the creative economy" and has served as Artist in Residence at Music Meeting in Nijmegen, Netherlands. He can be heard on over 60 titles spanning: jazz, hip-hop, rock and R&B. The Washington Post describes his book You Are Ketchup: and Other Fly Music Tales (Globe Pequot) as "written in a tone so conversational you can practically hear it in your ear, You Are Ketchup feels like a megadose of straight advice from a muso-mentor who's been there. And, of course, Kokayi has been all over the place." Kokayi has taught and facilitated workshops at the School of Improvisational Music teaching vocal improvisation as it relates to jazz and hip-hop. He is a collaborator and mentor with the international arts program OneBeat and has worked as a freelance music emissary with the U.S. State Department.

Kokayi considers himself an emcee and performer first, no matter the medium. Kokayi continues to act as a music producer and performer currently touring with his own band as well as with Ambrose Akinmusire, Terri Lynne Carrington + Social Science, Whose Hat is This?, Ego Mondo, Nate Smith +Kinfolk, Quite Sane, Sanity and with MacArthur Fellow Dafnis Prieto. Kokayi's forthcoming eponymous album is currently in production with a planned release in Spring 2024.

Rodrigo Martínez Torres is a Mexican composer interested in the abstraction of popular musical languages as a tool for new creations. He is also a multi-instrumentalist who performs in different genres and styles. He's currently traversing the spatio-temporal possibilities embedded in radio broadcasting technologies. He studied music composition in Academia de Arte de Florencia and in Núcleo Integral de Composición (CDMX). He holds a Master's Degree in Electroacoustic Composition from Centro Superior Katarina Gurska (Madrid, Spain),

and is currently pursuing an MFA in Sonic Practice at Dartmouth College.

He was granted the Arts Integration Grant by the Hopkins Center for the Arts at Dartmouth in 2023 for a project that mixes visual arts, architecture and music. He was a grant holder in the Mexican program Jóvenes Creadores by FONCA in 2018-2019, to write a piece for symphonic orchestra inspired by salsa. He was awarded a MacDowell fellowship (New Hampshire) in October 2019 to write a Drum Kit concerto.

Rodrigo was the grand prize-winning composer of the 2020 Dartmouth College Wind Ensemble Composition Competition. He also won the 2017 Arturo Márquez composition competition with his piece *Mambo Urbano* for chamber orchestra. His music has been played by German accordionist Eva Zöllner, Dutch ensemble Modelo 62, Mexican ensembles CEPROMUSIC, Liminar and Ensemble Tamayo, as well as by Italian pianist Gloria Campaner.
