Artist Statement

We first had the idea for a Symphony of Light in 2016; a light installation that would perform a symphony in which each instrument is replaced by a light source. Preferably outdoors, perhaps in the forest, the installation would surround the audience with a fluorescent orchestra. We planned to premiere this in 2019 and began our research and creation period in the Fall of 2018. Touki Delphine member John van Oostrum then first posed the idea of using car taillights as the light source. He built a prototype with which we experimented in the spacing of the lights and the coupling of various audio sources.

Igor Stravinsky's 1919 Firebird Suite, although not a symphony, quickly presented itself as an ideal musical match for the installation. A fiery mythical creature that rises from the ashes, rebirthing, tempting, guiding, rescuing, overseeing; a lone renaissance every 100 years. The Firebird ballet was first performed in 1910, but Stravinsky continued to temper with the music and created the renowned 1919 suite version with a new instrumentation for Swiss composer Ernest Ansermet, Our Firebird is an homage to this suite. 100 years later, on recycled tail-lights from local salvage yards, a reinvention of Stravinsky's re-invention.

We hope it sparks imagination, creativity and curiosity that have you return often, whether as an audience member or a creative artist. All are welcome to dream!
